2 Just then, a man came down the road. The Wind said, "Now we will see who is stronger. Let us see who can make that man take off his coat."

3 The Sun said, "That is a very good idea."

4 The Wind started to blow hard. The man got cold. He pulled his coat close around him. The Wind blew harder still. But the man pulled his coat up to his chin and held it tight. At last, the Wind gave up.

5 Then it was the Sun's turn. The Sun shone warm and bright. The man felt warm. He opened his coat. The Sun went on shining. Finally, the man stopped and took off his coat.

6 The Wind had learned a good lesson—It is better to be kind than to be tough.
